Rural Alaska Program

We bring day camp experiences to communities across Rural Alaska, focusing on wellness, cultural and intergenerational connections, and encouraging community engagement.

Summer Camps

Camp K, Camp Fireweed, and Summer Adventure Camp — three different summer camps operating in five locations, serving youth ages 5 through 17. We really do have something for everyone! There is an overnight camp, an outdoor day camp, and licensed day camp programs.

School Programs

Our after school programs are the cornerstone of our organization, where we deliver quality school-age programming in elementary schools throughout Anchorage and Eagle River.

Community Centers

Serving youth at no cost to families, these programs are offered before and after school, during school breaks, and over the summer at five different program sites.

Teen Leadership Programs

Serving teens ages 14-17, the Leader in Training Program at Camp K and the Counselor in Training Program at Camp Fireweed provide engaging learning and training opportunities that support the development of leadership skills and workforce readiness.

ADAPTING TO CHANGE

In Fall 2024, the Anchorage School District introduced an important change to school start times, prompting us to adapt our programs to best serve the community. This shift inspired a comprehensive reimagining of our program model—our first major restructuring in over forty years—to better meet the needs of families, youth, and educators across the city. Our goal was to ensure ongoing continuity of care and support for Alaska's youth, demonstrating our commitment to being responsive and adaptable in a changing environment.

It wasn't without challenges. Like many providers, we faced staffing shortages and operational hurdles. But thanks to strong partnerships—including with the Alaska Afterschool Network—we adapted quickly and strategically. Together, we adjusted staff-to-youth ratios to meet both programmatic needs and the realities of a changing workforce, allowing us to maintain the high quality of care our families count on.

Out of the disruption came opportunity.

This new model provides youth and staff with more concentrated time together after school, strengthening mentorship, building deeper peer connections, and creating a more supportive, nurturing environment. These extended hours also allowed us to expand our programming in meaningful ways—welcoming new community partners, offering more in-depth learning experiences, and empowering youth through creative, hands-on projects.

None of this would have been possible without donor support. Because of you, Camp Fire Alaska was able to lead with flexibility, resilience, and vision—turning a complex challenge into a powerful opportunity for growth. As a result, Alaska's youth are more connected, engaged, and inspired than ever. Together, we are building a stronger, more adaptable future—for every child, every family, and every community we serve.





ANCHORAGE'S OUTDOOR DAY CAMP

Tucked quietly behind a tangle of birch and spruce in the heart of Anchorage, Camp Fireweed is more than a youth day camp—it's a place where Alaska's wild beauty meets everyday life.

Every summer, laughter weaves through the trees as youth aged 5 to 15 explore a world crafted just for them. Camp songs echo through the trees, tiny hands dip into cold creeks, older campers build shelters with logs and moss, and all of them—regardless of age—feel the same magic: that sense of wonder that only the outdoors can bring.

Camp Fireweed offers something for everyone. The youngest campers chase butterflies and learn how to swim. Middle groups climb, hike, and paddle, while teens take on leadership roles, learning to guide others while deepening their own connection to nature. Each level is carefully tailored to challenge, excite, and inspire. In rain and shine, campers discover more about themselves as they learn new skills, brave exciting activities like the rock wall, and develop friendships that last well beyond the months of June and July.

But it's more than fun—it's rooted in something deeper. Camp Fireweed exposes youth to the true spirit of Alaska. Not just the mountains and rivers, but right here in our community, youth can find a quiet, special connection with nature: the crunch of fallen leaves, the call of a raven, the thrill of finding a fox track. For many, it's their first real taste of the outdoors—and for some, it's what convinces them to stay.

In a city full of cars, shops, and noise, Camp Fireweed provides an outdoor adventure just beyond the tree line. It reminds young Alaskans that nature isn't far away—it's home.

POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS

In Summer 2024, Camp Fire Alaska launched a powerful partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, rooted in a shared commitment to removing barriers and increasing access to the outdoors for youth.

Together, we set out to bring meaningful outdoor experiences to youth in communities who historically have had the least amount of access—starting at Loussac Place, our Community Center program in Anchorage.

The impact was immediate and inspiring.

Youth explored local streams, learned to fish, planted pollinator gardens, and carefully dissected owl pellets—engaging with the natural world in ways many had never experienced before. These hands-on opportunities sparked curiosity and built confidence, all while connecting youth to the rich ecological story of their home state.

Recognizing the momentum and value of this collaboration, we extended the partnership into the school year—bringing even more nature-based programming directly to our afterschool sites across Anchorage. From wildlife education to outdoor skills, we've been able to offer youth consistent, enriching experiences that deepen their connection to Alaska's lands and wildlife.

This partnership is a powerful reminder of what's possible when we work together.

By combining resources, expertise, and a shared mission, Camp Fire Alaska and the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service have reached farther and created a greater collective impact than either could alone. And thanks to donor support, we've been able to sustain and grow this effort—bringing nature closer to youth who need it most.

AMERICAN CAMP ASSOCIATION CHARACTER IMPACT AWARD

Camp K on Kenai Lake received the Character Impact Award for creating spaces for youth to grow, connect, and learn. Only one camp from each of the five states in the ACA Northwest Region received this honor. Recipients develop effective, creative responses to fill the needs of youth and use the camp environment as a teaching tool. Additionally, winners are chosen for their positive impact on the camp community and for fostering personal growth in individual campers.

Our Champions For Children breakfast and Wild Women Retreat both broke records this year!
